A Few Words About Our Collection

Miniature Stories is a Singapore-based company that designs and produces figurines about Singapore's history and way of life. We started off with the Singapore Army range, and later expanded into the Singapore Heritage Series.

Singapore's history spans more than two centuries. However, the 1950s to 1970s, which covers the period just before and after Singapore's Independence, is an era especially close to Singaporeans' hearts. Many of these individuals personally lived through these years and witnessed this milestone in our nation's history. It was a period of rapid change in Singapore, both economically and socially.

In a short period of time, many Singaporeans moved from communal *Kampung* style village communities to government-built HDB Flats. Many trades also became obsolete, and others were moved off the streets to designated areas. Buildings were constructed, and mobile street vendors and hawkers were moved to shopping centres.

Though all this change spelled progress for us as a nation, it also meant that the landscape of Singapore was forever changed. As a result, many memories of the old way of life in Singapore are held fondly and reminisced till this day.

Our miniatures serve as a way to remember the past, and for the young to visualise what life was like back then.

For this reason, we pay special attention to ensure the accuracy of each figurine. Each character and design is carefully researched from various sources, such as the National Archives, as well as through conversations with people who lived during that period.

The experience of creating this collection was deeply satisfying and meaningful for us, and we hope that it serves as an enjoyable and nostalgic display piece in your home.

INTRODUCTION

The history of Singapore began during the 14th - 15th Century, when Sang Nila Utama, a Sumatran prince, established the island as a trading settlement. Fast forward in time to 1819, Sir Thomas Stamford Raffles arrived from Britain, negotiated a treaty with existing rulers, and established the British colony of Singapore.

Singapore flourished and grew as a colonial port linking Singapore's trade to both the region and Europe, Economic opportunities attracted waves of migrants who flocked to the newly-opened port, turning Singapore into a cosmopolitan town.



The fall of Singapore in World War II marked the end of colonialism in the region. After the war, self-governance began, and the country gained independence on 9th August 1965.

Now, step back in time with us and relive the memories of early Singapore through our collection of Singapore Heritage Figurines. We begin with pieces that depict Singapore from the 1950s to 1970s, capturing aspects of their way of life, and reflecting Singapore's cultural and ethnic diversity through different trades and festivities. The collection also portrays the hard working and self-sacrificing spirit of our early pioneers who forged the way for Singapore's success. Our collection will be ongoing, as we continue to depict scenes from other time periods as well.





DRIED COCKROACHES, ANYONE?


When people were unwell or injured, many of them relied on traditional forms of medication.

DEATH BEFORE DISHONOUR

Our Singapore Heritage collection includes a figure of Lt. Adnan Saidi. He is a national war hero of Singapore, as well as Malaysia, where he was born. During World War II, he was posted to Singapore to fight the invading Japanese. There, Lt. Adnan was entrusted with the defence of Pasir Panjang Ridge - a critical position for British supplies and key installations. Though outnumbered, undersupplied, and with no hope of reinforcements, Lt. Adnan was able to rally his 42-man platoon for one last stand, in what has since become known as the "Battle of Opium Hill."

From 13 - 14 February 1942, they fiercely held off the 13,000-strong Japanese troops amidst heavy shelling and relentless assault. Lt. Adnan and his men refused to yield and fought to

their deaths, even taking to hand-to-hand combat when their ammunition ran out. At the end of the battle, Lt. Adnan was brutally tortured and killed by the Japanese, who took their anger out on him after the losses he caused them.

Today, the heroism and bravery of Lt. Adnan Saidi and his men live on in a museum called "**Reflections at Bukit Chandu**," where a war memorial plaque stands in their honour.

CHINESE OPERA TROUPE THE GREAT SEAL OF THE SIX KINGDOMS - 六国大封相

Chinese opera was introduced by Chinese immigrants in the late 19th century. Performed on makeshift stages, these operas were often sponsored by temples and clans, and staged for free public viewing for entertainment and at religious festivals in honour of deities.

"The Great Seal of the Six Kingdoms" is a Cantonese opera that tells the story of how the renowned politician, Su Qin, lobbied the six states to adopt the Vertical Alliance strategy and unite against the State of Qin.



SCALE, SIZE & PACKAGING

Our figurines are made of metal and individually handpainted. These unique keepsakes were made to last, and will provide joy and nostalgia for a long time. They are in 1/26 scale small enough to display in a scene without taking up too much space, but large enough to show different details that are true-tolife.
